Our focus. Your priorities.

This policing plan update highlights priorities that your community identified for us to focus on this year. It has been produced to update you on our progress.

Our focus has been on reducing crime and disorder, increasing public reassurance and keeping people safe in all of our communities.

We will continue to work closely with our partners and find effective long-term solutions to the issues you raised.

Local Priorities

This report covers progress we have made in dealing with your priorities and it includes our future plans. Your priorities for the Forth & Endrick area were:

1. Antisocial Behaviour

You are concerned about antisocial behaviour and underage drinking.

2. Road Safety

You are concerned about collisions, speeding and traffic offences around schools.

3. Housebreaking & Theft

You are concerned about housebreaking and thefts.

4. Community Engagement and Reassurance

You told us it was important to have community officers who you know, who are accessible and who address local problems.



Our actions to date.

- High visibility foot and mobile patrols have been put in place at the relevant times and places to tackle anti social behaviour and vandalism. Operation Ironworks continues to tackle anti social behaviour around Loch Lomond.
 - Joint visits with local licencing departments have been undertaken to ensure licencing regulations are being adhered to and the sale and supply of alcohol is done so in a responsible manner.
 - High profile operations have been undertaken including operation Westlock, to tackle road safety issues. Various people have been reported for offences ranging from speeding to dangerous and drink driving.
 - Dedicated patrols and operations have been put in place to tackle theft and housebreaking. A number of arrests have been made in relation to housebreakings and stolen property reunited with its owners.
 - Your community officers continue to attend local forums and meetings and in the more rural areas continue their drop in and joint elected member surgeries. An additional community officer has been dedicated to your area to bolster community policing.

In the coming months.

- We will work closely with schools to engage with young people regarding anti social behaviour with particular focus during the build up to bonfire night.
 - We will continue to provide dedicated anti social behaviour patrols to target areas identified by you as being a problem.
 - We will target our speeding patrols to areas identified by local people as being of concern.
 - We will liaise with the local authority and housing associations regarding those who are persistently involved in anti social behaviour.
 - We will dedicate policing operations to target theft and housebreaking.
 - We will ensure your community officers are available in your community to hear your views.
 - We will continue to work closely with partners regarding monitoring of licenced premises.
