FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

Tackling domestic abuse is a priority for Police Scotland and we are committed to working with our partners to reduce the harm it causes and ultimately eradicate it.

Domestic abuse is a despicable and debilitating crime which affects all of our communities and has no respect for ability, age, ethnicity, gender, race, religion or sexual orientation.

Police Scotland will not tolerate it.

Police Scotland will proactively target perpetrators and support victims to prevent domestic abuse from damaging the lives of victims and their families.

Police Scotland defines domestic abuse as:

"Any form of physical, verbal, sexual, psychological or financial abuse which might amount to criminal conduct and which takes place within the context of a relationship. The relationship will be between partners (married, cohabiting, civil partnership or otherwise) or ex-partners. The abuse may be committed in the home or elsewhere including online"


This definition is included in the Joint Protocol between Police Scotland and the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS), "*In partnership challenging domestic abuse*" which is a public document that can be found at the Police Scotland website on <u>https://www.scotland.police.uk/</u> or on the COPFS website on <u>http://www.copfs.gov.uk/</u>.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

The Lothians

I would please like to know the total number of closed cases regarding rape, sexual assault and domestic abuse crimes since 2017 in the region, how many resulted in charges and how many were dismissed.

If possible I would like the data to be broken down by year and ethnicity of the victim please.







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Following a clarification request you advised that by dismissed, figures on cases that were detected would be acceptable. You also confirmed that by the Lothians, you were referring to our Edinburgh and Lothian and Scottish Borders Divisions.

In regards to recorded and detected crimes for rape, sexual assault and domestic abuse since 2017, please find the requested statistics in the attached spreadsheet. They have been broken down into our E Division (Edinburgh) and our J Division (Lothian and Scottish Borders) as well as by year as requested.

I would ask that you note the caveats below each data table.

In regards to the breakdown by ethnicity for domestic abuse crimes, please find this information in the attached spreadsheet.

In regards to the breakdown by ethnicity for rapes and sexual assault crimes, I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with the information you have requested, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, the crime system used to record these offences does not have a way to automatically retrieve the information requested. Therefore a manual check of each relevant crime report would be required.

In this case 4,571 crime reports would need to be manually checked. At a conservative estimate of 3 minutes per record, this equates to over 228 hours of work to provide the information requested.

Police Scotland have assessed that the £600 cost limit within the Act equates to 40 hours of work and so this part of your request would breach the cost threshold.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.pnn.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision.

Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.

As part of our commitment to demonstrate openness and transparency in respect of the information we hold, an anonymised version of this response will be posted to the Police Scotland Freedom of Information <u>Disclosure Log</u> in seven days' time.

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
