Community Policing Plan Update 2016

Our focus. Your priorities.

Glasgow North Local Problem Solving Team

This Multi Member Ward Plan update will outline the priorities your community identified during our most recent consultation and will inform you of the progress we have made in the first half of the year. It will also highlight further steps we plan to take throughout the rest of this year.

Our focus is to reduce crime and disorder, to increase public reassurance within our community and to keep people safe.

We will continue to work closely with our partners to find effective long-term solutions to the issues you have raised.

Local Priorities

This update sets out how we intend to deal with your priorities. You identified that the priorities for the Maryhill and Kelvin area were:

1. Violent Crime

You told us your concerns regarding assaults and other violent behaviour in the community.

2. Drug Dealing and Drug Misuse

You told us of your concerns about drug dealing and drug misuse and the impact this was having on your community.

3. Antisocial Behaviour

You told us of your concerns about antisocial behaviour including street drinking, youth disorder and vandalism.

4. Housebreakings

You told us that you were concerned about the amount of housebreakings and thefts in your community.

We have acted on your concerns and we are sure you will have seen some improvements in the Maryhill and Kelvin area.

Our actions carried out to date.

We adopted an intelligence-led approach to tackle violent crime within the community. We have directed patrols to 'hot spot' areas to deter and disrupt those involved in violent crime. We have continued to visit licensed premises to ensure they are being operated responsibly.

We have continued to gather intelligence about people who deal in and use controlled drugs. We have executed warrants where drug dealing has taken place and we have worked with partner agencies to share information about drug misuse in the community.

We have worked with Community Safety Glasgow and local housing associations to target those involved in antisocial behaviour and provide a visible presence in each area. We have executed action plans involving our partners to detect those involved in antisocial behaviour.

We have continued to direct officers to patrol at key times to deter and detect those responsible for housebreakings. We have taken part in local initiatives to target crimes of dishonesty. We have worked with partners to offer crime prevention advice.

In addition to this, you can expect to see a number of other things happening in the next few weeks and months:

Utilising a new policing model, supervisors will continue to direct resources to priority areas to deter and disrupt violent crime. Officers will work with partners to focus on proactively targeting violent offenders and providing extra attention to vulnerable places.

Utilising the new policing model, we will continue to work with the public and partner agencies to gather and develop intelligence to deal with the misuse of drugs in the community. We will continue to prioritise education and enforcement strategies.

Local supervisors will continue to direct officer patrols to areas where antisocial behaviour persists. Officers will continue to work with partners to target antisocial behaviour and identify opportunities to bring offenders to justice.

We will continue to patrol at key times and have officers deployed in acquisitive crime 'hot spots.' We will continue to offer crime prevention advice and develop community intelligence on regular offenders and detect those responsible for crimes of dishonesty.
