## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

With regards to the Welfare visits (NHS Grampian's terminology.) I have documentation from NHS Grampian that it was know that [redacted] had taken a drugs overdose and in their words suicidal ideation.

So I ask Police Scotland to provide proof that Police Scotland did/ didn't know that [redacted] had taken a drugs overdose, secondly that all body cam videos have been kept as requested.

That all cctv footage from the custody suite is still available.

Your own SOP on treatment and welfare of detainees does not condone, encourage or recommend placing detainees known to have taken an drug overdose. How many times during his 24 hours in the cell did [redacted] see a nurse, who monitored, as in a previous communication Police Scotland stated that custody staff received no training in the treatment of detainees who were overdosing. When was [redacted] given is clothing back.

Having considered your request in terms of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002, I am refusing to confirm or deny whether the information sought exists or is held by Police Scotland in terms of section 18 of the Act.

Section 18 applies where the following two conditions are met:

- It would be contrary to the public interest to reveal whether the information is held

Whilst we accept that you may have a particular personal interest in being informed as to whether or not the information sought is held, the overwhelming public interest lies in protecting individuals' right to privacy and the expectation of confidence that the public have in Police Scotland as regards their information.

- If the information was held, it would be exempt from disclosure in terms of one or more of the exemptions set out in sections 28 to 35, 38, 39(1) or 41 of the Act

In this instance, sections 38(1)(b) and 38(1)(2A) of the Act apply insofar as you have requested third party personal data which is exempt from disclosure where it is assessed that disclosure would contravene the data protection principles as defined in the Act.

Sections 34(1)(b) - investigations and 35(1)(a)&(b) - law enforcement would also apply.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
