FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

My request relates to complaints and charges against The Universal Church of the Kingdom of God also known as UCKG. The church has at least one HelpCentre in your jurisdiction.

If any question is likely to fall beyond the time limit prescribed by the Act, please skip it and answer all those that can be fulfilled.

I would like to know:

- A. Broken down for each year (2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021), how many complaints were received by the force, in relation to the United Church of the Kingdom of God (UCKG)?
- B. If possible, broken down by year, what crimes did these complaints relate to?
- A. Broken down for each year (2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021), how many charges were brought against individuals in cases which related to the United Church of the Kingdom of God (UCKG)?
- B. If possible, for each year, what was the crimes for which individuals were charged?

For each year (2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021), how many times did the force visit/were called out to the following premises: 1104 Shettleston Road

Glasgow, G32 7PH

CLARIFICATION

With regards to Q1 – what do you define as complaints? Do you mean recorded crime reports for complaints about the organisation or incident reports which have been recorded on our police system?

Having considered your request in terms of the above Act, I would advise you that under Section 18 of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 (the Act), Police Scotland can neither confirm nor deny that it holds the information requested by you.

However, if the information was held by the Service, it would be considered exempt in terms of one or more of the exemptions detailed in Section 18 of the Act, which are listed below:

- Section 34(1) Investigations
- Section 35(1)(a)&(b) Law enforcement
- Section 38 (1)(b) Third party personal data

To disclose whether or not information was held would confirm whether or not the individual referred to was in some way known to Police Scotland.

If any information were held, it would be held for the purpose of an investigation and disclosure of such information would prejudice the prevention and detection of crime and the apprehension or prosecution of offenders.

This should not, however, be taken as conclusive evidence that the information you have requested exists or does not exist.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.pnn.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. You can apply online, by email to enquiries@itspublicknowledge.info or by post to Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner, Kinburn Castle, Doubledykes Road, St Andrews, Fife. KY16 9DS.

Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
