FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

1) For the calendar year 2021, please tell me how many incidents and crimes of animal abuse* you have recorded in which one of the following social media sites was named in the MO and/or the Investigation Summary Field

*By animal abuse, I'm referring to any of the following:

Intercourse with an animal by a male	88/3

In response to your request, I can advise you that Police Scotland record crimes using the Scottish Government Justice Department crime classification codes rather than Home Office classifications.

We have reviewed your request and there are none that are directly comparable for Scotland.

As such, in terms of Section 17 of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002, this represents a notice that the information you seek is not held by Police Scotland.

You may wish to submit a request after reviewing the Scottish Crime Recording Standard document: <u>SCRS Crime Manual (scotland.police.uk)</u> - which contains a list of offences (from page 52).

You should however be aware that any social media element may well cost exempt any request due to the need for all relevant crime reports to be examined.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
