FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

How many incident summaries have included the below term between February 2018 to-date - UFO

First of all, I must stress that Police Scotland do not consider key word searches for specific words/ phrases to be an accurate means of analysis.

I must stress that there may be incidents of relevance to your request which do not include the specific phrase 'UFO'.

It would however be nigh on impossible to come up with a list of comprehensive search terms - hence why we would not recommend the approach - but to illustrate, incidents may say 'unidentified flying object', 'lights in the sky', 'an object in the sky', 'lights above their house', 'lights over the park' etc

Similarly, although the phrase appears in an incident log, it cannot be assumed on that basis that the incident was directly related to the subject matter of UFOs.

The search facility in use means that incidents will be included in search results where UFO is part of a word - and it has proven to be the case with your request that the vast majority of hits were for incidents where 'UFO' is part of an address - ie Beauford Ave etc - or part of a vehicle registration number or other similar code.

Our initial search therefore identified hundreds of potentially relevant incidents which contained 'UFO' in the summary.

Having filtered the list to remove the common address words, we have been able to read through the remaining incidents to assess them for relevance in terms of whether UFO is included in the context of being an abbreviation for unidentified flying object.

Having done so I can advise that there are 17 incidents which *could* be described as reports of alleged UFOs.

For clarity, I can advise that there are a further 22 incidents where UFO is included in the correct context - ie as an abbreviation of 'unidentified flying object' - but the incidents are not reporting alleged sightings. To illustrate, one example might be a concern report for an individual who repeatedly mentions UFOs more generally etc.
