FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

Please can you provide me the number of accidents which took place on Lanark Road and Lanark Road West between 1 January 2019 to 1 January 2022 - Please provide the date of each accident.

If possible please can you provide details of each accident for example if a pedestrian was involved and which modes of transport were involved e.g. car, bus, bike etc.?

In response to your request, I have provided the table below which details recorded Road Traffic Collisions on Lanark Road and Lanark Road West between 1st January 2019 and 1st January 2022.

All statistics are provisional and should be treated as management information. All data have been extracted from Police Scotland internal systems and are correct as at 02/01/2022.

I have interpreted the date of each accident to refer to the year it occurred and the data is further broken down by collision severity:

Where those involved exchange personal details, there is no legal requirement to report a collision to the police and this applies particularly to non-injury collisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.pnn.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
