FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

Tackling domestic abuse is a priority for Police Scotland and we are committed to working with our partners to reduce the harm it causes and ultimately eradicate it.

Domestic abuse is a despicable and debilitating crime which affects all of our communities and has no respect for ability, age, ethnicity, gender, race, religion or sexual orientation.

Police Scotland will not tolerate it.

Police Scotland will proactively target perpetrators and support victims to prevent domestic abuse from damaging the lives of victims and their families.

Police Scotland defines domestic abuse as:

"Any form of physical, verbal, sexual, psychological or financial abuse which might amount to criminal conduct and which takes place within the context of a relationship. The relationship will be between partners (married, cohabiting, civil partnership or otherwise) or ex-partners. The abuse may be committed in the home or elsewhere including online"

This definition is included in the Joint Protocol between Police Scotland and the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS), "In partnership challenging domestic abuse" which is a public document that can be found at the Police Scotland website on https://www.scotland.police.uk/ or on the COPFS website or https://www.scotland.police.uk/ or on the collection of the

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

- Please can you tell me how many episodes of domestic abuse have been reported in the Inverness Area Command for the time period between 30 November 2019 to December, 1 2022. Could you please separate the information by year and include date of the incident.
- Could you please provide any relevant details you can share with regards to the reported cases.

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- Please can you tell me how many episodes of domestic abuse have been reported in the North Highland Area Command for the time period between 30 November 2019 to December, 1 2022. Could you please separate the information by year and include date and location (under town, address or county) of the incident.
- Could you please provide any relevant details you can share with regards to the reported cases.

Following clarification, you confirmed that domestic abuse crimes broken down by the gender and age of the perpetrator for our Highlands Police Division was acceptable. You also asked if the information could be provided for just Inverness also. As such, I have elected to deal with these two requests together.

In relation to the requested information from our Highlands Police Division, please find this in the attached spreadsheet. I would ask you to note the caveats provided.

In regards to Inverness, I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with the information you have requested, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, our interim vulnerable persons database which holds these statistics is not able to automatically retrieve the requested information and so a manual review would be required to extract the Inverness records from the Highlands Police Division records.

In this case 2,549 records would need to be manually checked. At a conservative estimate of 3 minutes per record, this equates to over 127 hours of work to provide the information requested.

Police Scotland have assessed that the £600 cost limit within the Act equates to 40 hours of work and so this part of your request would breach the cost threshold.

I would normally suggest a refined timescale is requested but even a single year is likely to exceed the cost threshold within the Act.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.





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If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
