Can you tell me how many gun licences have been approved over the past two years. Can I get a breakdown of area/age/sex please (if this is too costly though omit it)

How many licences been rejected and can you provide the reasons why.

Firearms Licensing statistics are produced by tax year (1<sup>st</sup> April to 31<sup>st</sup> March). The tables below provide a breakdown of applications which were granted and refused, by Processing Centre.

Please be advised that the term 'rejected' is not used in legislation.

An application is refused if the Chief Constable is satisfied that they do not meet the legislative criteria.

The reasons for refusal are listed under Section 27 and 28 of the Firearms Act 1968 or Section 5 of the Air Weapon and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015.

In relation to your request for a breakdown by age and gender of the applicant, I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with this, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, the licensing system SHOGUN has no facility which allows for the age or gender of certificate holders or applicants to be easily extracted.

As such, each individual application would have to be manually examined to establish the details of the person - an exercise which I estimate would far exceed the cost limit set out in the Fees Regulations.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions. Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to <a href="mailto:foi@scotland.police.uk">foi@scotland.police.uk</a> or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. You can apply online, by email to enquiries@itspublicknowledge.info or by post to Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner, Kinburn Castle, Doubledykes Road, St Andrews, Fife, KY16 9DS.

Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
