FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

Further to section 2.5 of the Mental Health Calls for Service report presented at the Scottish Police Authority's May 26 meeting (attached), please could you:

Provide a breakdown of access to dedicated mental health professionals across Scotland's police stations and custody suites, detailing which police stations and custody suites currently do and do not have access to these professionals.

I can advise that Police Scotland does not hold the above requested information. In terms of Section 17 of the Act, this letter represents a formal notice that information is not held.

By way of explanation, as per the report all Health Boards provide basic 'fitness to detain, interview, release and attend court' mental health assessments, which are carried out by nursing staff or on-call medical examiners. Many of the nurses employed in this capacity have enhanced mental health training, however the requirement for full mental health assessments requires referral to local community mental healthcare services'. That means that all persons who enter police custody will have access to a basic mental health assessment with a local pathway for more acute assessments.

Each of the Health Boards are best placed to provide the details of their staff who have enhanced mental health training as Police Scotland does not hold that information.

Provide me with any information and documentation used to compile section 2.5 of this report.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
