FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

A dispute has broken out over some unprotected trees in a factored estate in Edinburgh.

A resident has trimmed some unprotected trees on the land factored by Ross & Liddell factors. To be clear, they are not covered by a Tree Protection Order.

Another resident has threatened to call the police if any more trimming is done. The factor has ordered all trimming to cease.

Please send me any laws regarding trimming of unprotected trees on communal land that would necessitate police action.

Basically, can a resident be charged by police for trimming - or removing completely - unprotected trees on communal land?

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
