## 1. Purpose (Note 4)

1.1 This paper is presented to provide an update on Police Scotland's activity in Sri Lanka.

# 2. Background (Note 5)

- 2.1 In 2010 the Scottish Police College was funded by the Scottish Government to provide capacity and capability building support to the Sri Lanka Police Service, as they exited 30 years of civil war. Subsequently, since 2013, Police Scotland have been engaged by the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), previously FCO, to continue this support.
- The focus of activity (pre-COVID19) supported by the British High Commission (BHC), Colombo relates to the provision of technical assistance to:
  - establish better police engagement with communities
  - improve the response to domestic violence and sexual and gender based violence
  - improve gender equality within the Sri Lanka Police Service.
- Officers have not been deployed in Sri Lanka since the commencement of the COVID19 pandemic in March 2020.
- 2.4 As reported at the May 2021 International Development Board meeting, [S31(1), S32(1)(a)

The decision was taken at that Board meeting to 'pause' the programme whilst the Overseas Security and Justice Assessment (OSJA) is updated.

3.	Main Report (Note 6)
3.1	The Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) have updated the OSJA, attached as Appendix A. S31(1), S32(1)(a) The OSJA has been submitted to S38(1)(b)
	Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office for consideration.
3.2	The current FCDO contract, which has been paused since the start of the pandemic

	expires 31 March 2022. As such, if the OSJA is endorsed \$\frac{538(1)(b)}{200} a new contract will be required to recommence activity. To progress a new contract requires Police Scotland to affirm, or otherwise, to recommence activities and then for the Scottish Police Authority to sign the contract, with consent of the Chief Constable.
3.3	Whilst the UK Government may approve and support re-engagement in Sri Lanka, each individual deployment of an officer overseas requires approval from Scottish Government Ministers, as the officer is being deployed under Temporary Service Regulations. To seek approval for the deployment from the Scottish Government Ministers a business case is submitted with details of the person, date, task and with supporting information, e.g. copy of the OSJA.
3.4	Whilst the legislation requires that Scottish Ministers approval individual deployments, Scottish Ministers should have the opportunity to consider the wider impact that any deployments may have for UK and Scottish relations with other countries.
	Scottish Government Ministers are consulted to confirm that they would continue to approve business cases for police officers to deploy to Sri Lanka, to work on the themes to:  • establish better police engagement with communities  • improve the response to domestic violence and sexual and gender based violence  • improve gender equality within the Sri Lanka Police Service.
3.5	Over the recent months there has been significant interest in Police Scotland's activities in Sri Lanka with reports in the media, both in Scotland and in Sri Lanka, several parliamentary questions and Ministerial letters, and Freedom of Information requests. Several communications are seeking an end to Police Scotland's engagement in Sri Lanka on the basis of the human rights concerns.
