FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

- 1. How many dogs have been seized in Inverclyde since January 1 2017? Please break this information down by year.
- 2. Of the dogs seized, please tell me how many were put down. Please break this information down by year.
- 3. Please tell me the number of each type of dog that was seized in Inverclyde during the above period, broken down by year (i.e. there were 10 Staffordshire Bull Terriers seized in 2019)

In response to these questions, I must advise you that Police Scotland does not hold statistics or information regarding the number of dogs seized/ destroyed or costs etc.

With regard to dog destruction, this is usually done on instruction from the Procurator Fiscal and as such would be information held by the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service.

As such, in terms of Section 17 of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002, this represents a notice that the information you seek is not held by Police Scotland.

4. How many dog attacks were recorded in Inverclyde during this period?

In response to this question in terms of the Act, I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with the information you have requested, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, Police Scotland record crimes using the Scottish Government Justice Department crime classification codes. With regard to your request, offences such as these would be recorded as offences involving dangerous dogs. Therefore the only way to provide an accurate response to your request would be to manually examine each one

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of these crime reports since 2017 in the Inverclyde area to establish the circumstances are relevant to your request. There are no relevant markers which allow the automatic retrieval of this level of information.

If crime statistics on recorded/detected dangerous dog offences would be of interest, bearing in mind that these offences will not be 'attacks' please submit a new request for information.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to foi@scotland.police.uk or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
