I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

Please accept our apologies for the delay in responding.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

1. If you are using drones for surveillance purposes, on which legal basis do you rely for the collection and storage of data collected by drones?

Drones are not used for surveillance at this time.

2. Please provide us with information regarding what payloads could be fitted onto the drones, such as the type of cameras, sensors or other tools that you have previously fitted onto the drones.

At this time we deploy with thermal and optical cameras.

3. Please confirm if any of the drones have been combined with facial recognition technology?

We have not used nor are there any plans to use facial recognition technology.

- 4. Please provide us with the following:
- a) any guidance and/or policy you are relying on for the the deployment of drones
- b) Data Protection Impact Assessment (DPIA) in relation to the use of drones if one has been completed.

Police Scotland has a RPAS Code of Practice which aligns to the guiding principles of the Surveillance Camera code of Practice and is reviewed annually. A copy is available online.

A copy of the DPIA is attached. The document has been subject to minor redaction in terms of sections 35(1)(a)&(b) and 38(1)(b) of the Act.

5. Please confirm which private companies you have used for the procurement of drones.

I can provide that in February 2018 a three year contract was awarded to Martek Drones Ltd for £106,000.00.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
