FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

Please, first of all, accept my sincere apologies for the delay in providing a response to your request.

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

How many people have been arrested for knife crime for the following years:

May 2019- May 2020 May 2020- May 2021 May 2021 – May 2022

How many people have been charged through a knife crime for the following years: May 2019- May 2020 May 2020- May 2021 May 2021 – May 2022

Having considered these questions in terms of the Act, I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with the information you have requested, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, the only way to provide an accurate response to your request would be to manually examine each and every recorded offence as detailed in the below table to establish whether anyone was arrested or charged - an exercise which I estimate would far exceed the cost limit set out in the Fees Regulations.

To further explain, in Scotland police have the power to arrest an individual where there is sufficient evidence to support a charge against them - either for a common law offence or

for a statutory offence where the statute empowers the police to arrest any person contravening its provisions.

There is however no mandatory recording process in relation to arrests as not all offenders are routinely arrested when they commit offences and some may be subject of a report to the Procurator Fiscal without ever having been arrested or charged.

In response to this question, I would advise you that, Police Scotland record crimes as being recorded/detected using the Scottish Government Justice Department crime classification codes. Please see the tables below which details recorded offences which I have deemed to be relevant to your enquiry. I can advise that as each of the offences in the below table would require manual assessment to establish the number of victims Section 12(1) of the Act would apply.

Having considered these questions in terms of the Act, I must advise you that Section 12(1) would also apply to these questions.

As explained above, Police in Scotland do not record crimes by victim, arrest or whether a suspect is charged. As such, the only way to provide an accurate response to your request would be to manually examine each and every recorded offence in the above table to establish the age and gender of those involved - an exercise which would far exceed the cost limit set out in the Fees Regulations.

You may be interested in the <u>Scottish Crime Recording Standards</u> document which is available on our website for further details in relation to knife offences and circumstances where knife crime might not be recorded i.e. a stabbing on a private residence would be att. Murder etc.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to <u>foi@scotland.police.uk</u> or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
