FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

I am looking for information on the numbers or Road Traffic Accidents that have been reported to Strathclyde police/Police Scotland at the junction of Rodger Drive and Stonelaw Road in Burnside G73 3QZ. (A749).

Clarified as information on RTC's January 2012 to January 2022.

In response to your request, I can advise you of the following:

Road Traffic Collisions, Junction Where Rodger Drive Meets Stonelaw Road, Rutherglen (Broken by Collision Severity). 1st January 2012 - 31st January 2022 (Calendar Years)

All statistics are provisional and should be treated as management information. All data have been extracted from Police Scotland internal systems and are correct as at 03/06/2022.

Please note that a reportable collision is defined under Section 170 of the Road Traffic Act 1988 and describes the legal responsibility on those drivers involved to report the matter to the police. Where those involved exchange personal details, there is no legal requirement to report a collision to the police and this applies particularly to non-injury collisions.

As such, there may have been other collisions within the location of your request, which were not reported to Police Scotland, nor which required a collision report to be created, and will therefore not be included within the statistics.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
