I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

1. What percentage of serving officers and constables have received mental health first aid training or a similar equivalent? (Note: this is defined as training to support individuals suffering from a mental illness in a moment of crisis, not mental health legislative training or training relating to the wider presence of mental illness in society).

2. If possible, can this information also be broken down by division and command area?

Police Scotland do not currently have mental health first aid training for in moments of crisis however there is support - the Employee Assistance Programme - Officers/Staff can contact in any moment of crisis to speak with them 24hr/365 days.

The table below provides the number of police officer and police staff who have benefited from counselling since the current contract with HELP EAP started. This data is not recorded by Division.
