## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 2002

I refer to your recent request for information which has been handled in accordance with the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

Tackling domestic abuse is a priority for Police Scotland and we are committed to working with our partners to reduce the harm it causes and ultimately eradicate it.

Domestic abuse is a despicable and debilitating crime which affects all of our communities and has no respect for ability, age, ethnicity, gender, race, religion or sexual orientation.

Police Scotland will not tolerate it.

Police Scotland will proactively target perpetrators and support victims to prevent domestic abuse from damaging the lives of victims and their families.

Police Scotland defines domestic abuse as:

"Any form of physical, verbal, sexual, psychological or financial abuse which might amount to criminal conduct and which takes place within the context of a relationship. The relationship will be between partners (married, cohabiting, civil partnership or otherwise) or ex-partners. The abuse may be committed in the home or elsewhere including online"

This definition is included in the Joint Protocol between Police Scotland and the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS), "In partnership challenging domestic abuse" which is a public document that can be found at the Police Scotland website on https://www.scotland.police.uk/ or on the COPFS website on http://www.copfs.gov.uk/.

For ease of reference, your request is replicated below together with the response.

I write, under the terms of the Freedom of Information Act, to request the number of reports of domestic abuse received by this force where the victim identified as part of the LGBTQ community between January 2017 and June 2022.

As part of this request, I would like the information to be broken down into the following:

i) The number of domestic abuse reports received by this force where the victim identified as part of the LGBTQ+ community broken down into months, years and a grand total;





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## ii) The number of domestic abuse reports received by this force where the victim identified as heterosexual, broken down into months, years and a grand total;

In regards to both of your questions I regret to inform you that I am unable to provide you with the information you have requested, as it would prove too costly to do so within the context of the fee regulations.

As you may be aware the current cost threshold is £600 and I estimate that it would cost well in excess of this amount to process your request.

As such, and in terms of Section 16(4) of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 where Section 12(1) of the Act (Excessive Cost of Compliance) has been applied, this represents a refusal notice for the information sought.

By way of explanation, our Interim Vulnerable Persons Database (iVPD) does not record the sexual orientation of victims of domestic abuse in a format that would allow this information to be automatically retrieved. Whilst it is possible this information will be held within the free text of the report, a manual review of each domestic abuse incident would be required to determine the sexual orientation of the victim.

In this case 373,403 records would need to be manually checked for the period requested. At a conservative estimate of 5 minutes per record, this equates to over 31,116 hours of work to provide the information requested.

Police Scotland have assessed that the £600 cost limit within the Act equates to 40 hours of work and so this part of your request would breach the cost threshold.

Whilst I would normally suggest a reduced timescale is considered, even reducing the request to the most recent full year of 2021 would require 71,385 records to be reviewed which would take over 5,948 hours of work to complete. I unfortunately cannot see a way your specific request can be refined to be completed within the cost limits of the Act.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which Police Scotland has dealt with your request, you are entitled, in the first instance, to request a review of our actions and decisions.

Your request must specify the matter which gives rise to your dissatisfaction and it must be submitted within 40 working days of receiving this response - either by email to <a href="mailto:foi@scotland.police.uk">foi@scotland.police.uk</a> or by post to Information Management (Disclosure), Police Scotland, Clyde Gateway, 2 French Street, Dalmarnock, G40 4EH.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision. Should you wish to appeal against the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner's decision, there is an appeal to the Court of Session on a point of law only.
